Attracting, training and supporting the best researchers to tackle complex health and social care challenges


Collaborating with other public funders, charities and industry to shape a cohesive and globally competitive research system

What is the RDN: Our remit and purpose

The Research Delivery Network enables the health and care system to *attract*, *optimise and deliver* research across England. We do this as part of NIHR's mission to improve the health and the wealth of the nation through research.

This involves:

- **supporting the delivery of research** which has been funded by the NIHR, research charities, other public funders and the life sciences industry
- increasing capacity and capability to deliver research for the future
- covering 3 different types of research: clinical, public health and social care
- across 4 different settings: hospital, primary care, community and residential (or any of these in combination)


Expanding research delivery into more settings

- Hospitals: meaning NHS acute, mental health and pre-hospital care including all NHS Trusts except for NHS Community Trusts
- Primary care: including settings outside of general practice (for example, ophthalmology, audiology, dental)
- Community-based: including, for example, NHS Community Trusts, local authority settings, preventative activities, home-based care, community care teams, schools, social care delivered outside of care homes and hospital settings, and social work services
- Residential care: including, for example, care homes and hospices.

We cover the whole of England and consist of 12 Regional Research Delivery Networks (RRDNs) and a coordinating centre (RDNCC), working together as one.





108,415 participants in England recruited to RDN-supported research via GP practices

4,561

studies in England recruited participants through the NIHR RDN

1,180 of these were commercial

3,381 of these were

non-commercial

25% of GP practices recruited participants to NIHR-supported studies



The budget is **nationally calculated.** There are 3 components used to calculate the hospital delivery budget:

50%	Historical Allocation	Based on the allocation that organisation has received in the previous financial year - stability
30%	Activity Based	A measure of research activity conducted.
20%	Performance	Enhancements to funding through success against key system metrics.





50% of the budget is set based on the previous year's allocation. This provides a level of base **stability.**



Stability also supported by 'caps' and 'collars'






30% of the national budget is distributed on the basis of **non-commercial research activity** that an organisation has conducted over the previous 3 financial years.

The calculation takes into account:

- 1. The number of weighted recruits (70%)
 - 2. The number of studies (30%)

We are reviewing alternative options for measuring 'activity' for future years and we are keen to hear more from delivery organisations about these options.





A measure of research activity conducted - previously has been simple weighted recruitment but how can we do this more intelligently?

The **weighting** for recruitment in different study types has been updated based on analysis of study data and feedback from stakeholders:

Interventional	175
Observational	86
Large Scale Interventional	29
Large Scale Observational	1

1 recruit to an interventional trial has the same weighting as 175 recruits to a large scale observational trial. This allows the model to acknowledge the wide differences in research delivery costs across different study types.



Performance metrics driving the RDN funding model

Calculating funding for wider care settings

There are two ways that organisations from wider care settings can access RDN funding. You can receive **both** retrospective and prospective payments.

01	Retrospective Payments	 Activity based payments (study level Service Support Costs (SSCs)) made to any organisation in a wider care setting that has delivered RDN portfolio research. 		
02	Prospective Payments	 Awarded to organisations to allow them to develop their research delivery infrastructure, Based on the submission of a nationally standardised application.
